Most Reverend Raymond W. Lessard Remembered for Encouragement of Ecumenism and Canonical Status of Alleluia Catholic Fellowship

Most Reverend Raymond W. Lessard, twelfth bishop of the Diocese of Savannah, died on January 3, 2016. He is fondly remembered by members of Alleluia Community for his work in ecumenism and especially for his hard work and encouragement in obtaining canonical status with the Vatican for the Alleluia Catholic fellowship before his retirement in 1995.

A Mass of Christian Burial was offered at noon on Tuesday, January 12, 2016 in the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist in Savannah Ga., with Bishop Hartmayer as principal celebrant along with Bishop Emeritus Boland, other bishops and dignitaries from the seminary in Boynton Beach, Fl.,


most priests in the Savannah diocese, and many deacons.

Burial followed in the Catholic Cemetery of Savannah in a plot set aside for diocesan bishops and priests. Bishop Hartmayer and Bishop Emeritus Boland were the first to shovel dirt onto Bishop Lessard's grave, followed by most priests and many faithful. May he rest in peace.

tongues. How satisfying to be able to go about immediate tasks, still drinking in Jesus through his Holy Spirit. So, tongues can be a little like cool Brita water on hot days.

Kevin is almost totally better now, thank God. During that difficult time, I was keenly aware of the wonderful examples of caregiving that we have here in Alleluia, and how beautiful and life-giving they have been and are. There are so many other aspects of caregiving needed besides physical, of course. I found that the emotional and spiritual need was almost as challenging. So, keeping my spiritual water bottle filled was vital.

We learned a lot during Kevin's illness about the need for hydration. He had a bout with diverticulitis. You'll

see him with a water bottle daily, now. Dryness can set off that condition. We have a humidifier in our room now, also. The Mayo Clinic website suggests 3 liters of fluid daily for men and 2.2 for women, although there are many other factors involved for individuals. It says water makes up about 60% of our body weight. We can think of our own individual spiritual water bottles and nightly humidifiers. I guess, for me, that would be Scripture, spiritual meditation and contemplation, visits to church, a spiritual home environment and prayers in the car.

Drinking spiritual fluids in the morning and throughout the day: that's the point. Stay hydrated, my friends.
